# **SAFEGUARDING**

# Staying safe when out and about - information aimed at older students

In 2016, a member of the Sexual Violence Prevention Team in Lincolnshire, Inspector Hayley Crawford, introduced 'Ask for Angela'. It allows people being harassed in pubs, clubs and bars to request help from staff by asking for their fictitious colleague, Angela.

While the system has been widely adopted within the UK and in other countries, a recent report from the BBC highlighted that many venues displaying 'Ask for Angela' posters did not have staff who knew, understood or were trained to respond to a request for 'Angela'.

This will prompt venues to review their practices and hopefully make situations safer in the long term. For students who are going out socially, we want them to have a range of strategies to keep themselves safe.

We speak to students in school about their physical safety and would encourage these conversations to happen at home too.

The key strategies shared by the police are:

- 1) Make sure someone knows where you are and update them if you change venue.
- 2) Keep location status on for specific people only. Ensure a friend or family member has your location so they can find you if you need them.
- 3) Stay with your friends when you go out. Look out for each other and make sure you have a clear plan of where to meet, should you get separated.
- 4) Never accept a drink which is handed to you when you haven't seen it being made. If you are drinking from a bottle, keep your thumb over the top and don't put your drink down and walk away.
- 5) Seek help if you feel unsafe or unwell. Find a friend or a member of staff and get the help you need.

# **Child Criminal Exploitation**

Children and young people can sometimes be drawn into activities without their knowing or desire and become entangled in criminal activity. Charities such as the <u>Ivison Trust</u> work closely with young people and families impacted by exploitation of all forms. They work closely with the police and other agencies for long term change in areas where gangs are prevalent.

### How might young people become involved in criminal activity?

Often, young people are drawn into a world of exploitation through friends who may introduce them to older siblings, cousins or other friends. They may treat them very well initially, buying gifts or taking them to places like McDonald's or engaging in social activities, creating a social contract. Then, the young person is asked to do a favour for someone within the wider group. It is at this point that often they feel unable to say no, given they have gained so much from the group.

# **SAFEGUARDING**

#### What can parents do?

On the charity website you can hear from a parent whose son had been groomed. There had been a number of signs, but others had reassured her that it was normal teenage behaviour. She urged every parent who is worried to raise a concern.

#### What to look out for:

- Changes in appearance or demeanour
- Weight loss or gain, or significant changes in eating patterns
- Going missing or arriving home after an agreed time
- Anxiety around phone use, or others seeing their phone
- 'Life litter' unexplained money or products, receipts from places you have not taken them to, car keys (often kept by young people when vehicles have been stolen to order), bank cards (with a different name).

#### Who can parents raise their concerns with?

You can always raise a concern with us. We are well connected with local agencies and work alongside families to access support.

Vocab Express is an online vocab learning application that has been set up to support students with learning their French vocabulary, which is vital to examination success. Students should access this daily.



Seneca is free for students to use. It will present them with key information and then test them on it in various ways. Some staff are setting revision activities through this.



Quizlet allows students to create their own quizzes, flash cards and other revision material for free. They can then print these off or save them to re-use. Students can also access other people's revision material on the site.



Age Range: EYFS in Reception; Children in Years 1-6; Young Leaders in Years 7-11.


