Equipment Expectations

Please can you ensure that your child is fully equipped for the start of Term 4. Having the correct equipment is essential to support effective learning in every lesson.

Students are expected to have the following items every day:

Black pen Red pen Pencil Rubber Ruler Sharpener (New for Term 4) Scientific calculator

Mrs Stewart sells all of the above items each morning in the Upper Canteen. One of each item (excluding the calculator) costs just **49p**, so please encourage your child to take advantage of this if they need to top up their equipment. Scientific calculators can be borrowed daily if required.

Equipment will be provided free of charge to **Pupil Premium (PP)** students.

Students' equipment is checked daily during tutor time. If a student is missing equipment, a behaviour point will be issued by their tutor. As equipment is imperative for learning, we appreciate your continued support in ensuring students arrive at school fully prepared.

Reminder - Parking on School Site

Can we remind parents and carers to not drop off on school site unless a parking permit has been arranged. Parking permits for drop off are to be organised directly with the Attendance Team.

Uniform Issues

Can we remind parents and carers that where a student is missing a uniform item, they will be asked to wear a loan item in most cases. We only issue passes for medical or short term adjustment reasons. Forgetting to have an item will mean borrowing something. Failure to comply with this will result in a student being sat in internal until a parent or carer can drop off the relevant item. Thank you.

SAFEGUARDING

We would like to wish everyone a Happy New Year. January can be a difficult month as the joy of Christmas passes. Below are just a few reminders about how we keep ourselves safe. At Latimer we are offering this year, as a new service, a wellbeing drop-in at a break and lunchtime with our Wellbeing Practitioners. Students should look out for posters about times and locations. We now have two of our Pastoral Team qualified as Mental Health First Aiders.

I would like to urge students not to be drawn into potentially bad habits during these dark and boring months. As parents and carers, be aware to the pitfalls of vaping. Some vapes have been known to include cannabis. Whilst in school we take a hard line with vaping, it is quite common now socially amongst older teenagers, especially at parties. Another item to be aware of is “snus”. A nicotine pouch put inside the mouth. These give a release of nicotine straight into the system and are used by older male teenagers in particular.

Obviously alcohol consumption is also prevalent at parties. Alcohol taken too young can induce sickness and most worryingly cause youngsters to lose co-ordination. Please educate your child about the dangers of drinking, especially things like neat vodka. At parties, vodka equivalent to several shots is poured with coke for example and far more potent than a bottle of beer. It will taste like coke, but contain what we, as adults, would count as several measures in a pub.

My advice is always be aware that the above are far more common than we realise. Education and trust are the best ways forward for us as parents/carers and if you are worried there are various national websites on the dangers of alcohol and vaping. Gilbert



Kahlo





CAREERS

National Apprenticeship Week - 9-13 February 2026

It is National Apprenticeship Week from 9th - 13th February, a week-long celebration of everything that is great about apprenticeships. During this week employers will be coming into assemblies to discuss their apprenticeship experience as well as what apprenticeships they offer. In the Future Me tutor sessions will be focussed on apprenticeships.

Apprenticeships are an alternative to college or sixth form after GCSEs, which fit the criteria of being in education, employment or training for young people under the age of 18. Apprenticeships open to 16 year olds are either Level 2 (Intermediate) or Level 3 (Advanced). After college or sixth form, students may choose to undertake a Level 4/5 (Higher) or a Level 6/7 (Degree) apprenticeship, although in some circumstances they may start on a Level 3 then work up.

Current available apprenticeships are now starting to be advertised for summer/autumn starts. Vacancies can be found on the Government website <https://www.gov.uk/apply-apprenticeship> as well as on company websites, via recruitment agencies, and even on social media – follow the careers accounts of companies. If your young person is in Year 13, opportunities are being regularly emailed to them. Year 11 and Year 13 apprenticeship seekers are also being offered careers appointments where we can help with CV creation and apprenticeship applications.
