The students are enjoying the Spring sunshine and the chance to be on the field at lunchtime. We hope the good weather will continue next week and wish you all a happy Easter.



Tackling non diverse and non inclusive language

I hope you have all received my direct email about understanding Emojis. I think this is important and feeds into some of our work to combat the area around attitudes shown by some males towards females in particular.

I am liaising with the PSHE Lead to build in some discussions around misogyny into each year group.

Our goal is to develop Latimer to be even more inclusive and to celebrate diversity, building on the work we did as a school to secure our Anti-Bullying Award in 2023, to continue to develop a better understanding of a diverse culture.

Welcoming Andre Agissol into school to speak to our Year 8 students, as part of the basketball event, was a first step in exposing our students to inspirational speakers and a different perspective.

I would invite you to familiarise yourself with tools such as this one - What is misogyny? Guidance for parents and carers | Internet Matters.

The most important part of our role at school is to debate and discuss. To raise awareness. To challenge pre-conceptions. We will continue to do this through assemblies and PSHE lessons.

I have also introduced a new category on Satchel:one aimed at capturing offensive language. This is where something isn't aimed specifically at someone, but used casually and with the potential to cause offence.

Students have been reminded that such language is not in line with our core values.

Physical Altercations

I would like to assure parents and carers that the school continues to sanction any students who fight with each other at school with a suspension. Physical altercations that make students feel unsafe are not acceptable. This includes play fighting.

LEARNING AND PROGRESS

PSHE Focus

This term PSHE lessons have been going full throttle in every year group on a variety of topics whilst developing the core values of Honesty, Excellence, Ambition, Respect and Teamwork.

Year 7 have been learning about how their bodies and minds will change as they go through puberty and this topic which will change to Politics and Parliament after Easter. Every student has been researching and completing tasks on physical changes to their bodies, emotional changes caused by their increased hormones, intellectual changes to their brains and the development changes that occur, as well as what changes happen socially to them. Students have been wowed and had their minds blown on what will happen and are now better prepared for what lies ahead.

Year 8 content has been focused on developing a community on an island with a group of strangers. They have had to vote for a leader, create a religion, develop rules and regulations for their inhabitants as well as being creative while giving their island a name. It has shown to be an innovative way to develop democracy skills and work as a team. Next term they will move onto the topic Identity, Sex and Relationships, which will definitely prove thought provoking and interesting.

Year 9 have been working on developing and maintaining body confidence. They have looked at **Self-Esteem** and **Bullying** in its various forms and also looking at **Cancer Prevention** linked to a healthy lifestyle. Students have built upon the knowledge that they had from previous years' study and added some vital skills in lessons. Next term they are working on the topic Sex, The Law and Consent which I am sure will involve some hard thinking and possible controversial opinions raised.

Year 10 have been working on Mental Health and Well-Being. They have covered controversial topics such as Child Sexual Abuse, Mental Health Illnesses, Self Harm and the thoughts and feelings associated with Suicide. All topics are taught as part of the statutory guidance required by the government and with strict rules and provisions to safeguard students in the classroom. Their next topic is going to be Risk, Relationships and Sex Education.

Year 11 have been developing their knowledge on Finance and the future along with preparation for their external exams. They have covered topics such as transitioning from school to work, their first pay day, buying on credit as well as university expectations and planning for their pension. Some groups also created their revision timetable ready for their exams to start to make sure that they are fully prepared.

In the next term all year groups will be learning about Misogyny and Equality in Society, addressing key issues raised by recent events and media coverage.

Others decided to brave the descent, mapping out potential escape routes and using clever signalling techniques to call for help. Every form brought a different strategy to the table, showing creativity, teamwork, and a surprising amount of survival instinct — all under the looming threat of time. All house teams performed well, but it was Attenborough House who impressed our judges the most with their well thought out plan and excellent teamwork.

Year 12 Work Experience

As part of our Raising Aspirations programme, we ask all Year 12 students to undertake a careers based work placement designed to develop their employability skills, increase their appreciation of the commercial world and inspire future career choices.

We cannot express how valuable work experience is and are encouraging our students to find a minimum of 5 days (which may be spread across more than one placement) from 30th June - 4th July. During this period, there will be no classes, as students will be at the workplace of their host employer.

We are aware that many employers now adopt remote working and, therefore, finding a placement may be challenging and that your child may need your help. For this reason, we would very much welcome your input in guiding and supporting them through this process. Students (and their families) should source their own work experience placements. The Careers and Sixth Form team will do their best to find placements for any students who have been unable to find their own, but because we have limited resources, we expect only to be able to help a few students.

NHS Pharmacy First Service

If you, your child, or a family member is feeling poorly, think **Pharmacy First**! Community Pharmacists offer free and confidential advice for minor illnesses such as coughs, colds, and eye infection. If appropriate, they can also provide treatment without a prescription for seven common conditions:

- Urinary tract infection (women aged 16-64)
- Sinusitis (adults and children aged 12+)
- Sore throat (adults and children aged 5+)
- Earache (children and young adults aged 1-17)
- Infected insect bite (adults and children aged 1+)
- Impetigo (adults and children aged 1+)
- Shingles (adults aged 18+)

Think Pharmacy First for expert advice that could be quicker than seeing your GP. This service takes away the potential delay of having to wait for a GP appointment and may help ensure children get well and back to school as quickly as possible, as well as supporting parents/carers to also get better sooner if they are unwell.

Patients that are already exempt from prescription charges, such as children, will still be exempt from charges if treatment is provided for the listed conditions, otherwise usual prescription charges will apply.

Should the pharmacist be unable to help, they will direct the person to their GP surgery or other health professional as appropriate.


Congratulations!






Thursday 1 May
