Drink Awareness

As Christmas approaches there are sometimes festive parties and social activities for teenagers. Social events at bars, clubs or even house parties are likely to involve alcohol, and young people need to be mindful of the risks of drink spiking.

This term refers to a drink being tampered with - typically with a drug - without their knowledge. While teenagers may be aware of this because they have seen videos on their social media feeds, often they are unaware of the significant risks posed. Unfortunately, this can often be viewed as a practical joke, and it is typically more likely to happen to women and girls.

Common symptoms of drink spiking can include:

- Feeling nauseous
- Feeling drowsy, dizzy or faint
- Feeling drunk, sometimes described as feeling 'out of it', despite not having consumed alcohol
- · Passing out
- Waking up feeling confused about events from the previous day.

Open conversations are a great way to prepare young people for such social environments and to counter the material they see online. Key protective advice includes:

- Go out with trusted friends and make sure you remain together
- Always ensure you see the drink being poured
- Don't taste or drink someone else's drink
- Throw away a drink which tastes differently from what you expected it to be
- Don't accept drinks from strangers
- Report concerns to an adult
- Remove themselves from a situation where they feel uncomfortable.

These topics are covered within PSHE in Key Stages and we encourage open conversations about them. If you have any concerns about your child, please reach out to their form tutor or a member of the pastoral team.

Safe Spaces

We have been in communication with Police about anti-social behaviour within our community. The vast majority of our students are well behaved and polite, both inside and outside of school. However anti-social behaviour by young people exists, and if it is in our community there is a likelihood it will be our students. When interacting with some parents/carers the Police have found they have been surprised when presented with evidence showing them that it is their child/ren involved - so we support the plea from the Police to you as parents/carers to ensure that in the holidays, evenings and weekends that you know where your children are, who they are with, and what they are doing. Thank you.

Update on Sanctions

The new C1 does not lead to a sanction. It is a reminder of expectations aimed at supporting students. This helps us monitor regular low level distractions so we can work with students and parents/carers to reduce any behaviours that disrupt learning.




Year 8 World of Work Day

Many of our Year 8 students had an amazing day on their Take Your Child to Work Day last month. A massive thank you to all the parents and carers who organised their children's workplace visits. Students experienced a huge range of job sectors, from beauty salons and hairdressers, schools and nurseries, design and engineering companies, gardening, manufacturers, painting, plastering and plumbing, as well as airlines, hospitals and financial services!







For take your child to work day I went to St Mary's primary school with my neighbour. The school provides a service of education from early years to year 6. I worked in early years all day. We had exploring time, some maths, and they practised there nativity show in front of me.

I was surrounded by a welcoming community of 38 people including teachers, SLT, TAs and pastoral.

Skills I learnt include: listening, speaking, problem solving, creativity and leadership. Comparing work to school

If someone has an accident they go to either first aid or doctors or even if nessasary a&e.

If someone does something wrong at work they would receive consequences including a formal warning and possibly loosing your job.

The company don't offer apprenticeships and you couldn't work there straight after year 11 you would


