Work Experience at The Wellcome Sanger Institute

Introduction to work experience

- My name is Reggie Hall, I am a Year 13 student at The Latimer Arts College.
- > I am studying A level biology, chemistry, and maths, as well as partaking in an EPQ project.
- I wish to pursue a career in biomedical sciences once I have completed my studies.
- When I first learned that I would be going on work experience, I knew I wanted to go somewhere that would help me decide whether this career was right for me. I was offered a placement at The Sanger Institute, and this is where I completed my work experience earlier this year.

What is The Sanger Institute?


- > The Wellcome Sanger Institute is a world leader in genome research that delivers insights into human, evolutionary and pathogen biology.
- > It is located on the Wellcome Genome Campus, in Hinxton, Cambridgeshire.
- > It was founded in 1992 by Sir John Sulston, in an effort to undertake the most ambitious project ever conceived in biology the Human Genome Project.
- It is named after Frederick Sanger, a huge figure in the field of genomics.



What did I do on my work experience?

- At The Sanger Institute, I had a timetable for each day that involved many different activities, such as...
- A few tours of the campus, including the data storage rooms, where over 90 petabytes of data is stored, which is equivalent to around 351.6 million IPhone 15's!
- An observation session of the pre-PCR and post-PCR malaria sequencing laboratories, where samples are prepared and processed before having their genetic information sequenced, using specialised machines.
- A work-from-home day, where I researched and created my own presentation on a topic that linked to genomics.
- Presented my findings on the final day in front of a group of scientists that work at The Sanger Institute, and received lots of feedback on how to research effectively.





My experience at The Sanger Institute.

- During my short time at the Sanger Institute, I got to experience many interesting aspects of work in a research focused setting. I took part in and observed some truly fascinating work.
- I also met many amazing people, who shared with me their vast knowledge on many subject matters, and information about how they reached the position they are in today.
- I already had an idea that I wanted to go into lab work, and this experience massively helped me to conclude that I wanted to pursue a career in a laboratory environment, particularly in a research based field.



So, why is work experience so important?

- For me, the most important part of work experience was that it provided an insight into the world of work post-18, and really helped me settle on what I wanted to do in the future. At this stage of life, knowing whether a career path suits you or not is vital in helping you to decide what you will go on to do after A-levels.
- On work experience, you will meet so many interesting people that can give you valuable lessons about the jobs they do, and what they did to get there. It also gives you a chance to network, and connect with people that may be able to help you later in life, with mentorship, career advice, or even job opportunities.
